## PINAL HISPANIC COUNCIL HOLDS OPEN HOUSE

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Construction on Pinal Hispanic Council's new office building has been completed and staff has moved in, according to Ralph Varela, President/CEO of the agency. Everyone is invited to the Grand Opening on Friday, December 9, he added.

The newly constructed building is a positive addition to downtown Eloy. The 8,216 square foot facility has a community meeting room, as well as a workout and "wellness" room for clients. The \$1.6 million project was funded by stimulus funds through U.S. Department of Agriculture. The building was designed by David Ortega Architect and Associates of Scottsdale. The facility was constructed by Dean Douglas Development Inc. of Chandler.

Pinal Hispanic Council, a counseling and abuse prevention agency, has offered services out of their offices in Eloy for over 20 years. In the last decade the Council has grown in number of clients served along with growth in number of staff. In fact the staff has doubled with currently 85 staff. They had outgrown their main Eloy facility trying to shift office space to make room for new staff. Their second Eloy office, 519 N. Main St., office will remain the prevention office and will serve as the teen center. The Council has two offices in Casa Grande, one each in Coolidge, Nogales and Douglas. The Council also has five housing units in Coolidge, and Arizona City for the mentally ill.

Not only will the new facility allow more room for 25 staff members, but members of the community will have available a 1,500 square foot community meeting room. It will have its own separate door to allow for easy access especially after hours when the office is closed for the day. The meeting room is equipped with a projector and screen and audio visual equipment for training or presentations.

"We want to make the community room available to individuals who want to hold meetings there", Varela explained. "We want to make sure to continue to have the relationship with the stakeholders who have been real supportive. There are a lot of meetings that can be held here, but there is not a lot of accommodation in this area. With our new facility, they don't have to worry about where to meet."

Varela added "PHC is pleased to have a new facility to meet the needs of our members and staff. The facility is about a place focused on compassion, personal and collective journeys, recovery, wellness, hope, and empowerment.

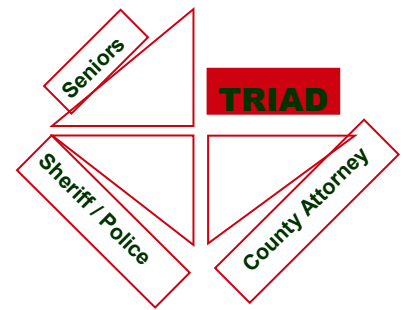

The Latino Familia Initiative announces that recruitment is underway for the 2012 Hispanic Leadership Institute-Pinal.

The Latino Familia Initiative invites and encourages individuals of diverse backgrounds to apply for this valuable leadership development opportunity. “Data from the U.S. Census demonstrates that Hispanics are a visible and emerging population in Arizona. HLI-Pinal will proactively assist participants with tools and skills to heighten their involvement at the local level through civic engagement and service to the community,” says Lisa Fitzgibbons, LFI Board President.

The Hispanic Leadership Institute-Pinal is a 10-week program of weekly classes conducted in the evening primarily at Central Arizona College starting Thursday, February 12, 2012. The deadline to apply is Friday, December 16, 2011 by 5 p.m. HLI-Pinal offers participants the opportunity to engage Arizona’s foremost business and policy authorities in a continuing dialogue about leadership and Latino communities. The HLI-Pinal enhances participant’s understanding of the role culture plays in a variety of circumstances, with specific attention to the enduring influence of Latinos in Arizona and the distinctiveness of Pinal County. The curriculum builds from participants’ experiences, emphasizing personal and professional development with a practical orientation. Sessions focus on ethics, cultural and personal identity, community issues, public/media relations skills, board/commission service, and meetings and protocol among other topics.

The mission for HLI-Pinal is to promote the development of individuals for increased participation in leadership roles. The Institute serves as a principal education and networking resource that promotes advocacy on leadership issues affecting the Latino community.

The Hispanic Leadership Institute-Pinal was designed to educate, assist, develop, and expand leadership skills. Students are encouraged to take an active role in the community. Participation in HLI-Pinal requires a competitive application process and is open for all individuals of diverse backgrounds. HLI-Pinal was founded in 2005 as a partnership between Valle del Sol, the Latino Familia Initiative, and Central Arizona College.

**KEEP A HOME WARM THIS WINTER**

The U.S. Department of Energy projects that average household heating costs could increase by up to 8 percent this winter, and those charges will be extracted from family budgets already stretched thin in a cold economy. **The National Fuel Funds Network (NFFN)** is a non-profit whose members distribute more than \$100 million in utility assistance each year. Among the grateful: Claudia Ramirez of Hamilton, N.J., along with her husband and two children. After his trucking business slowed down earlier this year, the family fell two months behind on their gas bill; the help they received allowed them to avoid compounding debt. This winter is shaping up to be a challenging one for the NFFN, as federal energy assistance may be reduced by as much as 30 percent. Just \$10 provides one day of heat for someone in need; \$70 covers an entire week.

**CAHRA COMPLETES TARGETED INTAKES**

In what turned about to be a “record breaking” effort, CAHRA staff and volunteers visited nine Pinal County communities and assisted **778** households with **\$480,185**. This amount includes not only LIHEAP funding, but **\$30,690** of other utility funds.

CAHRA Executive Director, Mary Lou Rosales stated that these numbers represent a **28%** increase over

previous years. She also indicated that at nearly every site, people had to be turned away because there simply were not enough hours in the day to see everyone.

Mary Lou said that so many of the people that came for help were already without utility service and had been for quite some time and others were facing immediate disconnect. She said that in past years the LIHEAP (Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program) Funds were used primarily to provide grants to utility companies on behalf of the applicant. In fact, she said, back then most of our applicants were “non-crisis” payments. With the current economy – that is no longer the case.

*Who Received Assistance:*

- *237 Single mothers with children; 192 Two parent families; 14 Single fathers with children; 335 Households without children (seniors and disabled); 431 on fixed incomes (some households received both fixed income & earned income*
- *362 receiving income and/or UI Benefits; 120 households reported no income*
- *639 households were at or below 125% of Federal Poverty Level*

Ms Rosales also expressed appreciation to the many municipal and community organizations who worked with CAHRA to make these intakes possible. Without our partners we simply could not have accomplished all that we did. She made special mention of the Police Departments in the Apache Junction, Florence, Maricopa, Casa Grande and Eloy. She said that it became apparent that with such large numbers of people coming out for assistance, it was important to have law enforcement on hand to protect the safety of people coming to the sites.

Mary Lou said that CAHRA staff were pretty much exhausted after the last intake, but she praised them for their good humor, patience, fortitude and their willingness to always “go the extra mile” for their clients.

Finally Mary Lou said she wanted to tell each and every person who came to apply for assistance “thank you for sharing your stories with us - we are deeply honored by your trust in us.” We are hoping that our Congressional representatives will fight to keep the LIHEAP Program alive because it really does help people.” Mary Lou said that today funders want to concentrate on “outcomes” and oftentimes overlook the value of emergency assistance to insure the safety and stability of lives.

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**Public Housing Eligibility Criteria**

- Photo I.D. for All Adults household members.
- Social Security Cards for all members in household who are a U.S. Citizens or Eligible Immigrant status.
- Birth Certificates/Baptismal for all members in household.
- Must not exceed the income limits for the household.

The following checks will be done on all adult members in household:

- Criminal Back-ground- must be crime free for the last three years and disclose all of criminal history
- Criminal history (regardless if it’s more than three years old, if charges were dismissed, and etc.)
- Registered Sex Offenders not eligible for Public Housing
- Rental history check of all adult family members in household. (Only applies to Public Housing)
- 4 Personal References (non-family). (Only applies to Public Housing)

**Grounds for Denial**

- PCHCD is not required or obligated to assist household where the applicant or members of the applicant’s household:
- Does not meet any one or more of the eligibility criteria
- Has a history of failing to maintain their housing in a decent and safe condition where habits could adversely affect the health, safety, or welfare of other tenants;
- If any household member has been convicted of manufacturing or producing methamphetamine in a Section 8 assisted property , public housing development, or on premises of other federally assisted housing (denied for life);
- Has not been crime free for the last three years, fail to disclose all of criminal history; has been involved in drug and/or gang related criminal activity.

**Incomplete Files**

PCHCD can return the applicant to the waiting list without notification for the following reasons:

- Does not supply information/documentation required by the application process;
- Verifications did not meet the ten (10) day deadline.
